





Summary report of the 2019 ATAR course examination: Italian: Second Language

Summary

The examination consisted of a Practical and Written component. Candidates performed equally well in both. Almost all candidates completed all sections of the examination.

General comments

Practical examination

Most candidates prepared well for the examination; however, many used rote-learnt information.

Advice for candidates

- Avoid using rote-leant responses. Engage directly with the questions asked.
- Be prepared to refer to the images provided in the stimulus when you answer questions.

Advice for teachers

- Ensure that students are familiar with the structure of the examination.
- Provide students with strategies to answer relevant questions from the unit topics without relying on rote-learnt material.
- Provide opportunities in class for students to practise answering questions on various unit topics.

Written examination

Overall, candidates performed consistently well in all three sections of the paper. Common errors were not applying the conventions of text types and using incorrect grammar.

Advice for candidates

- Your responses must be in correct English. Be aware of idiomatic expressions and do not translate them literally.
- Read questions carefully to ensure that your answer includes the information requested.
- Ensure that you refer to the information provided when you answer questions in the Stimulus response.

Advice for teachers

- Prepare your students on the examination format.
- Provide your students with opportunities to practise the requirements for audience and text type and ensure that they use the correct register.
- Provide opportunities for your students to engage with graphic stimulus items to prepare them to answer questions in the Stimulus response.

Comments on specific sections and questions

Practical examination

Part B: Discussion of stimulus (23 Marks)

Many candidates demonstrated less preparation for the discussion than in the past, with many relying on rote learnt content. Most candidates spoke accurately and clearly, with good intonation.

Part C: Conversation (24 Marks)

Many candidates spoke confidently in this section of the examination. They were able to show a wide range of vocabulary and expressions. Most candidates spoke with appropriate accent and intonation

Written examination

All sections of the paper were well attempted. However, to gain full marks, candidates needed to understand some cultural aspects.

Section One Response: Listening (33 Marks)

Questions 4 and 5 proved to be the most difficult in this section, with a number of candidates not attempting them.

Section Two Response: Viewing and reading (30 Marks)

Candidates found Questions 17 and 22 to be the most challenging in this section.

Section Three: Written communication Part A: Stimulus response (20 Marks)

This section provided candidates with a brochure as stimulus and gave them the choice of answering one of two questions. Questions 23 was overwhelmingly the more popular choice.

Section Three: Written communication Part B: Extended response (20 Marks)

Generally, this section was done well, with all four questions achieving similar marks.
