## General comments

Overall, candidates achieved higher results in the Multiple-choice section compared to the Short response and Extended response sections. Most candidates attempted every question, though a few candidates may have omitted parts of a question. Several candidates used very similar answers for different parts within a question, indicating that they possibly could not discriminate what the question was asking. Many candidates answered the questions asking them to 'describe' very simplistically, and not using appropriate terminology where required.

## Advice for candidates

- Read questions carefully and ensure you understand what the question is asking.
- Provide answers that specifically address each question.
- Ensure you understand key differences in verbs used in questions for example an 'explain' questions requires more detail than a 'describe'. Refer to the Glossary of key words used in the formulation of questions, which can be found on the course page.
- When asked to provide two or more points about a particular aspect, ensure each point is distinctively different.


## Advice for teachers

- Review past examination papers to assist students in understanding the Glossary of key words used in the formulation of questions.
- Expose students to questions that have multiple parts that are sequential so that students understand how to build upon answers without repeating the same information.


## Comments on specific sections and questions

Section One: Multiple-choice ( 20 Marks)
All questions were attempted by all candidates. As with previous years, this section of the examination was the most successfully answered section.

## Section Two: Short response (96 Marks)

The mean for this section was $58.57 \%$, which was an improvement over the previous year of $47.05 \%$. Most candidates attempted all parts to each question. Candidates successfully answered Question 21 part (a) and 23 part (e), while they found answering Questions 21 part (e), 22 part (h)(ii) and 24 part (a) more difficult. The first two of these more challenging questions required candidates to explain and justify their choice. Candidates generally did not use appropriate terminology, nor clearly outline their response.

## Section Three: Extended response ( 60 Marks)

Section Three offered candidates the opportunity to demonstrate their skills in interpreting text, diagrams (including a graph) and data. As with the previous section, all candidates attempted the questions set, but some did not answer all parts of the question. This section had a lower mean of $50.63 \%$ than the mean of the previous sections. Many candidates did not achieve full marks for their descriptions and explanations as they struggled to provide sufficient detail and use appropriate terminology.
