




Summary report of the 2024 ATAR course examination report: Aviation



Summary

The course was examined in two parts: a practical examination and a written examination. In the practical examination, candidates performed well with a mean of 78.65%. This was lower than the mean in 2023 (85.12%). The lower mean is likely because the practical examination included a part of the syllabus that had not been recently examined. The paper was an appropriate length, as most candidates attempted all questions.

General comments

Practical examination

Candidates continued to perform strongly and were well-prepared for the examination. The weakest area of performance was observed in the take-off and climb section.

Advice for candidates

- Listen to instructions carefully and adhere to the instruction given rather than what is expected.
- If uncertain about the requirements, ask for the instruction to be repeated.
- Ensure you are well-practised in all areas of the standard operating procedures (SOPs) rather than what was in the previous year's examination.

Advice for teachers

• Provide students with practice in all aspects of the syllabus to ensure familiarity with all possible areas of assessment outlined in the Practical Requirements document.

Written examination

Overall, there was a large spread of marks, and a number of questions allowed for discrimination among candidates. The paper was completed well by most candidates with very few questions not attempted.

Advice for candidates

- Ensure handwriting is legible to allow for ease of marking.
- Use the marks allocated to each question to inform the level of detail required in the answer.

Advice for teachers

• Provide practice questions based on a wide variety of areas within the syllabus including newer technology to comprehensively prepare students.

Comments on specific sections and questions

Practical examination

A high standard of performance was observed in the practical examination.

Written examination

Section One: Multiple-choice (20 Marks)

Overall, candidates performed well, achieving a mean of 67.57%. All candidates answered Question 18 correctly. Strong means were also recorded for Questions 1, 4, 13, 16 and 19. Candidates experienced difficulties with Questions 2, 5, 11 and 20.

Section Two: Short answer (145 Marks)

Overall, candidates performed to a high standard in this section, with a mean score of 61.62%. There was a range of candidate performance, with some questions more challenging than others.
