## General comments

Candidates demonstrated competence in their understanding of the syllabus content. There were few instances of questions not being attempted, indicating that candidates had time to complete the paper and felt confident in their ability to do so. Candidates demonstrated a sound understanding of micro-encapsulation, the Australian Association of National Advertisers (AANA) Code for Advertising and Marketing Communications to Children and influences on the global distribution of food resources. Questions related to digestion, waste disposal and natural food components received weaker responses. There was an improved use of course terminology compared to previous years.

## Advice for candidates

- Provide additional information in your answers to support the statements made.
- Ensure that your writing is legible so that markers can read and understand your responses.
- Read the questions carefully and avoid repetition in your answers.


## Advice for teachers

- Stress the need for legible writing.
- Use practice questions to demonstrate the provision of supporting statements.


## Comments on specific sections and questions

## Section One: Multiple-choice (15 Marks)

All candidates attempted all questions. Candidates performed best in Questions 1 and 4 and found Questions 12 and 15 the most challenging.

## Section Two: Short answer (55 Marks)

There were eight compulsory questions in this section. Candidates needed to include additional information to fully explain or describe the statements they made and to demonstrate their application of knowledge in order to achieve full marks.

## Section Three: Extended answer (40 Marks)

Candidates were required to respond to two questions from a choice of three. Question 25 was the most popular choice.
